This expression was applied to the Pharisees in Matthew 15:12-14. They were neither the first nor the last to deserve the designation. Consider the political and social leadership in our own nation today. We have spent staggering amounts to improve education, yet we are told there is a crisis in American education. We have poured billions into eliminating poverty, yet we are constantly bombarded with horror stories concerning the plight of millions of people. We are clearly in deep trouble with crime in the U.S., and yet it has been given all sorts of attention for decades. Could it possible be that those leading us are not solving problems because they are **blind** to what really lies at the root of **all** these troublesome developments?

Money hasn't bought us the security we have sought. Why suppose that spending more will change things? Readily available data show a clear connection between all of these problems and certain developments in our society: (1) the decline of traditional homes, (2) the acceptance of non-biblical moral and ethical standards, (3) a secularization of public education, (4) increased concern in religion with people-pleasing, (5) increasing lack of a sense of responsibility in the public media and (6) growth of centralized bureaucratic power in government. There is no improving the plant (society) without first correcting the roots that feed it. If our leaders are blind to the real trouble, then what?

This Week's Q&A

Q: By what means did Cyrus conquer Babylon?

A: In Jeremiah 51:11-58, verses 14, 20, 36 and 39 specifically describe how Cyrus conquered Babylon. During the siege of Babylon by Cyrus, verses 14 and 16 as well as secular history describe his tactics. Based on history (see the Cylinder of Cyrus, and Scripture), Cyrus had his men to dig a trench to divert the waters of the Euphrates (which ran through the center of Babylon) into a marshy area. This diversion, as the above verses describe, makes the entire area desolate. Some commentators say he and his army were able to walk underneath the gates of the city on a dry riverbed. Others say the water was thigh high. Verse 20 states Cyrus was used as God's battle-axe. See also Daniel chapters 5 and 6.
