# Idle Words Cleon Lyles

## "But I say unto you, That every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment" (Matt. 12:36).

The term "idle words" here signifies wicked, malicious, injurious, slandering, impious words. This does not refer to innocent talk on subjects secular and social. It gets before us a very serious matter that should be understood, because innocent people are going into the judgment without realizing they have been guilty of this crime. Some people who would shudder if obscene language should be used in their presence are guilty of this crime. The Lord condemned it as severely as He did any use of the tongue in an improper manner. It involved the same thought as expressed by the Lord through James in James 4:11. *"Speak no evil of one another, brethren." In other words, "speak nothing to the injury of any one."* 

The most common method of doing harm to people and nations is the practice of using idle words. By means of propaganda many countries have been divided and lost. In fact no more effective means have been discovered than the use of words. A false statement will lead to a false conclusion. The statement itself may have enough truth in it to make it sound good, but it may have enough falsehood to make it all false. A little leaven spoils the whole lump. A little error mixed with truth will destroy the truth. "He that keepeth the whole law, yet offends in one point, is guilty of all."

This is not only a common evil among people of the world, but it is satan's most effective weapon against the church. He can usually find someone who possesses a heart filled with envy who is willing to be his agent in passing out false propaganda. This agent will look for followers.

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Usually he has his own method of securing hearers, maybe through appeals to sympathy. When followers are found, or some weak brother is located, small statements are dropped. He in turn takes them to others. In this way satan has divided many churches and hopes to continue to do so. Simple minds can be used in this way to spread a doctrine that was false from the beginning. The creator of the false doctrine draws back into the shadows and allows someone else to do his dirty work. In this way congregations have been destroyed, false doctrines allowed to creep in, and satan has taken over where the Lord once reigned.

These are serious matters that thinking people can see where many cannot. When a church prospers, grows stronger and larger, treats its preacher right, preaches the gospel without fear or favor, stays out of political matters and runs its own business, satan is not pleased. Hence he will see that someone comes to town and plants a few rumors in places he considers weak in order to stop the progress of the church. All growing churches have had this experience and will continue to have it. Those that love the Lord, do what is right, remain united and run their own business will grow stronger and be a credit to the cause of Christ. Others will finally be destroyed.

May the Lord help us to be neither the giver nor receiver of idle words. May He help us to continue to press forward in His service, ever mindful of His will and unmoved by the ways of the world as we accomplish great things for Him. He has brought us this far because we listened to Him only, and He will continue to bless us if we continue to listen to Him.

#### Q: What was a "mess"?

A: A serving or portion of food, in Genesis 43:34 and 2 Samuel 11:8.

Context: It was a custom in ancient times for a host to send special choice servings of food to guests from his own table. Even though all guests had sufficient food, those tidbits from the host suggested special honor to those who received them, as in the case of Joseph's offerings to Benjamin in Genesis 43. A mess from a host could sometimes be used to coerce one, as King David's efforts in 2 Samuel 11:6-9 with Uriah. Esau lost his birthright for a morsel of meat (Hebrews 12:16).

Aside: Be careful what messes you bring to the table and what/whose messes you eat!
